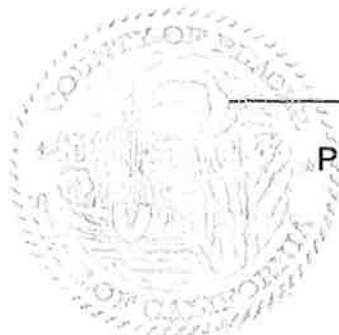



Placer County Election Report

March 5, 2024

Presidential Primary Election

The Placer County Elections Office conducted the Presidential Primary Election on March 5, 2024, in the State of California. Placer County had a 48.33% turnout, with 135,869 ballots cast throughout its 29 vote centers.

This document presents the facts of the project in stages including Pre-Election, Election Day, and Post-Election. It goes into every area that requires action and, while narrating the procedures followed, it will present figures and numbers resulting from the process.

This report covers the activities that started with election preparation. In the Election Preparation section of this report, the reader will be presented with the context of the election, the process for the training of election aides, how vote by mail ballots were prepared, a description of the voting systems used, and the security measures deployed. The next section, Election Day, describes the technical issues that occurred on E-Day and how the semifinal official canvass was wrapped up for the night. The Canvassing section details the post-election processes, including provisional vote processing and other relevant findings. However, canvass activities are detailed throughout the report as a whole.

I would like to recognize all the individuals who helped the Placer County Elections Office conduct a very successful Presidential Primary Election. I would particularly like to call out the tremendous dedication of our volunteers and staff who successfully implemented our move to vote centers. From our dedicated team of permanent and temporary staffers to the 457 election aides and election night workers that comprise the backbone of any thriving election, to the voters of Placer County whose participation ensures that all our hard work matters, I thank you.

Election preparation

The election held on March 5, 2024, was a Presidential Primary Election, as defined in section 1202 of the California Elections Code. This election included the presidential, U.S. senatorial, congressional, state assembly and senate, county, and central committee candidates' nomination contests. Additionally, one local measure and one statewide measure appeared on the ballots in Placer County. A summary of this information is presented below.

In 2023, Placer County began its move from a polling place voting model to that of a vote center model. By 2024, Placer County had fully established its vote centers and drop boxes to serve its citizens with key placement of its vote centers and drop boxes.

The county saw many changes this election due to the aforementioned change from polling places to vote centers. Staff worked tirelessly on the transition and should be praised for the time and efforts made to improve the electoral system in Placer County. Voter education played a big piece with a minimum of four direct contacts to every voter (two postcards, the county voter information guide, and the vote by mail packet). Several improvements were offered in our vote centers. These included, but were not limited to, curbside voting units, wireless disability enabled doorbells, new accessible smartphones, deployment of new and improved voting booths, ballot on demand printers, electronic real time connected rosters (laptops), signature guides, facsimile ballot packets, new handheld magnifiers, translation line (telephone enabled translation service), and a significant increase in the number of poll workers at each location. Placer county offered vote centers which afforded its voters the opportunity to vote in person up to 11-days early and through election night. Voters had the ability to see their vote by mail ballots scanned in real-time or have precinct specific ballots printed for them on-demand and scanned. Poll workers were able to validate voters had not already voted, update voters' political party affiliation in real-time, reissue ballots, and reduced the numbers of provisional and conditional voters dramatically.

A total of 29 vote centers and 30 drop boxes were established throughout Placer County. To cover the staffing needs for the election, a total of 457 election aides were placed. Through the work of staff, Placer County was fully staffed on Election Day. The number required to operate in each vote center was reached and the election was able to move forward. Election aides were placed in required Spanish, Korean, Punjabi, and Tagalog targeted vote centers.

Vote centers and election aides

California Elections Code section 12304 establishes a minimum number of election aides needed to run a vote center at three. However, Placer County has traditionally set the minimum at a higher threshold than required by law. In Placer County, precinct boards were made up of two senior election aides (SEA), and up to eight election aides (EA). Therefore, our recruitment target to operate this election in Placer County was 290. During the process of recruiting the election aides, a total of 15 resigned their positions after being placed. Placer County also utilized teams of two drivers to lock drop boxes throughout Placer County on election night. Additionally, the Elections Office utilized the services of courier teams who retrieved the secured ballots from each vote center in Placer County after closing and returned the same to Elections headquarters daily. Based on California elections code section 12303, Placer County must place bilingual election aides in targeted precincts. Twelve Spanish bilingual election aides, one Punjabi bilingual election aide, one Korean bilingual election aide, and one Tagalog bilingual election aide were placed. The vote center locations targeted for these placements were decided utilizing US Census and State of California data based on the geographically targeted precincts in the surrounding area(s).

To source the poll workers, the Elections Office used the following mechanisms:

- Placer County Human Resources posted extra help positions on the job board for Senior Election Aide and Election Aide positions, as well as on its social media platforms informing interested individuals.
- Staff placed recruitment phone calls.
- Placer County's Public Information Office (PIO) recruited within the community by posting information in the weekly Placer County e-newsletter, on the county's website and social media pages, and via a press release distributed to media outlets throughout the county.
- Outreach calls were made to service clubs to encourage them to volunteer and raise money for their organizations.
- Announcements were made at election aide training classes of the need for more volunteers.
- High school outreach efforts were made to recruit student volunteers to serve as student poll workers.
- The Registrar of Voters and Elections Manager made recruitment efforts on several television new outlets.

Placer County also had the services of ten (10) students from its local high schools who served as student poll workers at various vote centers within the County, including one who served as a Korean bilingual translator as backup.

Training

Training for election aides was mandatory in Placer County.

The Placer County election aide training presentation and Election Aide Procedure Manual were reviewed to ensure they both conform to the 2024 Poll Worker Training Standards which included:

- New Items for the March 5, 2024, Presidential Primary
- Vote Centers
- The Mission and Role of the Poll Worker
- Importance of Cultural Sensitivity
- Assisting Voters with Disabilities
- Poll Worker Responsibilities
- Opening and Closing the Polls
- Operating the Voting Equipment
- Voting Process at the Polls
- Vote-By-Mail Voters
- Provisional Voters
- Electioneering and Poll Watchers

Voting equipment

Placer County deployed one ICE (The ImageCast Evolution Scanner) and four ICX (The ImageCast X Touch Screen) voting units in each of the 29 county vote center locations for the March 5th, 2024, Presidential Primary Election. As utilized by Placer County, the ICX machines are intended for use by and voters but have specific functionality for voters with specific needs and supplement the ICE voting system, which continues to be used as the primary precinct and vote-by- mail voting system in the county.

Placer County's ICX's were prepared for the election in accordance with approved guidelines and requirements, including installation of software and pre-election diagnostic testing, memory card creation and installation, security seal logging and installation, and post-election diagnostics, if

needed. These same procedures and requirements were also followed for Placer County's ICE machines, and in addition, the county's ballot counting (Dominion) servers had all software installed prior to the Election from the approved source media.

Security procedures

Placer County followed the security procedures below, set forth in the Secretary of State's Conditional Certification Requirements, approved guidelines and procedures issued by Dominion Voting Systems, Inc., and the Secretary of State's procedures related to tabulating precinct votes issued.

Specifically:

- No additional software developed by Dominion Voting Systems, or other systems modifications, other than that specifically listed in the voting system vendor's certificate, was installed on the County's servers running Election Management System Software Version 5.2.18.2.
- The system shall be utilized in a configuration of parallel central election management systems separated by an "air-gap" where (1) a permanent central system known to be running unaltered, certified software and firmware is used solely to define elections and program voting equipment and memory cards, (2) a physically-isolated duplicate system, reformatted after every election to guard against the possibility of infection, is used solely to read memory cards containing vote results, accumulate - and tabulate those results and produce reports, and (3) a separate computer dedicated solely to this purpose is used to reformat all memory devices before they are connected to the permanent system again.
- No substitution or modification of the voting system shall be made with respect to any component of the voting system, including the Use Procedures, until the Secretary of State has been notified in writing and has determined that the proposed change or modification does not impair the accuracy or efficiency of the voting system sufficient to require a re-examination and approval.
- Dominion Voting Systems Inc. shall deposit an exact copy of the trusted build files to a State of California-approved escrow facility within 10 business days. These build files along with the source code and all associated software and firmware shall be escrowed in a California-approved source code escrow facility, pursuant to California Elections Code section 19212. Pursuant to California Code of Regulations section 20641, within five working days, the vendor shall certify to each affected election jurisdiction, with a copy to the Secretary of State, that it has placed the software in escrow.
- Immediately after any repair or modification of any voting system component that requires opening the housing, the integrity of the firmware and/or software must be verified using an automated mechanism, or all software must be reinstalled by the jurisdiction from a read-only version of the approved firmware and/or software supplied directly by the Secretary of State before the equipment can be put back into service.
- No network connections to any device not directly used and necessary for voting system functions may be established. Communication by or with any component of the voting system by wireless or modem transmission is prohibited at any time. No component of the voting system, or any device with network connectivity to the voting system, may be connected to the Internet, directly or indirectly, at any time.
- Upon request, members of the public must be permitted to observe and inspect, without physical contact, the integrity of all externally visible security seals used to secure voting equipment in a time and manner that does not interfere with the conduct of the election or the privacy of any voter.

- Where voting equipment is used to record and tabulate vote results in a vote center, upon closing of the polls, the election aides are required to print two copies of the accumulated vote results and one audit log from each device. Each election aide must sign every copy. One copy of the vote results from each device must be publicly posted outside the vote center. The second copy, along with the audit log, must be included with the official election material that is returned to the jurisdiction headquarters on election night.
- Election aides are not permitted to participate in any post-election manual count auditing of precinct results from a precinct in which they were an election aide.
- Elections officials must develop appropriate security procedures for use when representatives of qualified political parties and bona fide associations of citizens and media associations, pursuant to their rights under Elections Code section 15004, check and review the preparation and operation of vote tabulating devices and attend any or all phases of the election. The security procedures must permit representatives to observe at a legible distance the contents of the display on the vote tabulating computer or device. This requirement may be satisfied by positioning an additional display monitor or monitors in a manner that allows the representatives to read the contents.
- With respect to any part or component of the above-described voting system for which the chain of custody has been compromised, the security or information has been breached or attempted to be breached, or experiences a fatal error from which it cannot recover gracefully (i.e., the error is not handled through the device's internal error handling procedures with or without user input, such that the device must be rebooted or the device reboots itself to restore operation), the following actions must be taken:
 - The chief elections official of the jurisdiction must be notified immediately.
 - The Secretary of State must be notified within 24 hours upon discovery.
 - The equipment must be removed from service immediately and replaced if possible.
 - Any votes cast on the device prior to its removal from service must be subject to a 1% manual tally or a risk-limiting audit, by the processes described in Elections Code sections 15360 and 15367, as part of the official canvass.
 - Any memory card containing data from that device must be secured and retained for the full election retention period.
 - An image of all device software and firmware must be stored on write-once media and retained securely for the full election retention period; and
 - All device software and firmware must be reinstalled from a read-only version of the approved firmware and software supplied directly by the Secretary of State before the equipment is placed back into service.
- Voting systems certified for use in California shall comply with all applicable state and federal requirements, including, but not limited to, those voting system requirements as set forth in the California Elections Code and the Help America Vote Act of 2002 and those requirements incorporated by reference in the Help America Vote Act of 2002. Further, voting systems shall also comply with all state and federal voting system guidelines, standards, regulations, and requirements that derive authority from or are promulgated pursuant to and in furtherance of the California Elections Code and the Help America Vote Act of 2002 or other applicable state or federal law when appropriate.
- Voting system manufacturers or their agents shall assume full responsibility for any representation they make that a voting system complies with all applicable state and federal requirements, including, but not limited to, those voting system requirements as set forth in the California Elections Code and the Help America Vote Act of 2002. In the event such representation is determined to be false or misleading, voting system manufacturers or their agents shall be responsible for the cost of any upgrade, retrofit or

replacement of any voting system or its components parts found to be necessary for certification or otherwise not in compliance.

- The vendor must establish a California County User Group and hold at least one annual meeting where all California users and Secretary of State staff are invited to attend and review the system.
- Voting systems certified for use that utilize a barcode or QR code for tabulation shall be subject to the following:
 - Jurisdictions shall develop procedures and conduct training for election aides, prior to every election, regarding voter verification of barcodes or QR codes used for tabulation.
 - In conducting pre-election testing pursuant to Elections Code section 15000, the jurisdiction shall validate the logic and accuracy of the barcodes or QR codes used for tabulation.
 - In conducting a one percent manual tally pursuant to Elections Code section 15360 or a risk limiting audit pursuant to Elections Code section 15367, the jurisdiction shall perform a further review of any ballot examined pursuant to those sections that contains a barcode or QR code used for tabulation. Further review shall verify that the information contained in the QR code or barcode matches the voter verified, human readable text.
- Only the Secretary of State supplied trusted build for the Democracy Suite 5.10 voting system shall be installed. Jurisdictions shall validate prior to any election that the voting system is identical to the Secretary of State supplied trusted build by utilizing the Secretary of State trusted build HASHes.

Vote-by-mail ballots

Ballots were sent out on February 5 (E-29) to all active registered voters in the county directly from the vendor's printing facility to the West Sacramento Regional Mail Distribution facility; this order accounted for 281,148 ballots. The Placer County Elections Manager went onsite to the printing facility to perform quality control, randomly selecting vote by mail packets to confirm the correct political party and precinct combination ballots were being sent to the correct voters. This quality control allows us to confirm ballot printing quality, addresses, barcode printing, envelope printing and insertion quality prior to a single ballot being mailed. Subsequent requests were mailed directly from our vendor's printing facility with the exception of one grouping of cross-over requests, registration, re-registration, and requests for replacement ballots that were handled in-house by printing, assembling, and dispatching of ballots to ensure our voters would receive their ballot in a timely manner.

Placer County issued 298,718 vote-by-mail ballots, of which 125,292 were returned to the Elections Office. Of the 120,574 returned ballots, 4,301 ballots were returned by the post office as undeliverable, and 417 remained as challenged or voided at the end of canvass.

During the Presidential Primary Election held on March 5, 2024, RAVBM or military and overseas civilian ballots were issued/reissued to voters either previously registered in the program(s) or per voter request for this election only. Of those issued, 690 were successfully delivered their RAVBM ballots, and 24 RAVBM ballots were rejected using the new system.

Election Day

Election aides were instructed to be at their vote center location at 7:00 a.m. on the days preceding Election Day and 6:00 a.m. on Election Day to allow plenty of time for setting up the

center. The setup of the vote center included installing all the Help America Vote Act (HAVA) equipment required to mitigate access barriers, organizing the center in the necessary layout, and setting up the laptops, ballot scanner and ballot marking devices. The total number of election aides who worked the March 5, 2024, election was 457 which exceeded the minimum requirement set by law.

All vote centers opened promptly at 8:00 a.m. on pre-election days and 7:00 a.m. on Election Day.

Technical issues at the polls

Placer County's IT help desk hotline for technical issues began operating at 7:00 a.m. on February 24. On Election Day, March 5, the help desk opened at 6:00 a.m. to provide technical support to all vote centers. From February 24 to March 5 there were 143 incidents that required technical support. The table below shows the distribution of the calls:

Closing of polls and semifinal official canvass

Polls closed at 4p.m. on the pre-election days and 8:00 p.m. on Election Day. No reports of any delays were received from any of the vote centers. At that same time, the Elections Office secured and collected all ballots in the 30 drop boxes throughout the county and checked our fax accounts for any UOCAVA vote transmissions. Anything that would have arrived after that time at any of those locations would have been considered past the deadline established by state law for receiving ballots.

At the vote centers, elections aides began producing final count reports for both the ICE and ICX at each of their locations. They also began accounting for all ballots in their centers (spoiled, unused, surrendered, etc.), and ensuring that all the returned materials were packed according to the procedures provided by the Elections Office. Once the closing process was completed, the vote centers' materials were delivered to the courier teams and followed by law enforcement until they were accepted into the custody of the Elections Office in Rocklin.

Vehicles started to arrive at the Elections Office in Rocklin after 9:00 p.m. and continued to do so until approximately 1:00 a.m. on March 6, 2024. Each arriving vehicle was unloaded, and the staff proceeded to verify that all ballot boxes, ballot bags, and memory cards had arrived. In the same process, the seals of each memory card were verified against the log created prior to dispatching them to ensure integrity of the unit. If a unit had a broken or non-matching seal, then the precinct ballots were recounted prior to sending the data to the SOS. The semiofficial canvass was completed on March 6, 2024.

Canvassing

A total of 104 provisional ballots were cast in Placer County; more than 85% of them were qualified to be counted once they were reviewed by the Elections Office. Additionally, a total of 446 conditional (same day) voter ballots were cast in Placer County; more than 97% of them were qualified to be counted once they were reviewed by the Elections Office. Ballots that were not counted were cast by voters who were determined as not qualified to vote or did not cure their issue before the canvassing ended.

Official canvass

This report addresses the manual-count to machine-count comparison of a randomly selected one percent of the central count and vote center scanners verses hand count. With 29 vote centers, Placer County needed to randomly select one vote center to comply with Elections Code Section 15360. Using black out canisters, numbered 1 through 29, we randomly selected a canister to identify the vote center number for that portion of the manual tally. The vote center selected for inclusion in the manual tally was VC26 – Granite Bay Library. We manually counted 12 additional vote center locations during our manual tally, they included; VC27 – Granite Bay High School, VC22 – Meadow Vista Community Center, VC25 – Foresthill Veterans Hall, VC13 – Springview Middle School, VC19 – The Old Firehouse, VC04 – Maidu Community Center, VC01 – @the Grounds, VC11 – Rocklin High School, VC12 – Sierra College, VC24 – Colfax Veterans Hall, VC02 – Buljan Middle School, and VC09 – Roseville Veterans Hall for a total of 6,062 vote center (in person) ballots. Additionally, mail ballots were included in this process. At the time of the random draw, we had counted 279 batches of vote-by-mail and uniformed and overseas citizens ballots. We needed to hand count a minimum of three batches to comply. However, we performed the manual tally on seven batches to include all contests. We assigned those batches numbers 1 through 279 and ran a random generator on those numbers. The batches selected were 62, 247, 260, 237, 46, 181, and 182. The following batch numbers were utilized for the manual tally; VBM 4 Tab 34 Batch 58 (62), VBM 2 Tab 32 Batch 53 (247), VBM 1 Tab 31 Batch 35 (260), VBM 5 Tab 35 Batch 56 (237), VBM 2 Tab 32 Batch 45 (46), VBM 2 Tab 32 Batch 30 (181), and VBM 5 Tab 35 Batch 33 (182).

In this election, 2,708 ballots were challenged for having a non-matching or missing signature. Within the mandated cure period, the Placer County Elections Office reached out to voters by mail, phone, and/or email to cure 2,441 of those, accounting for a 90% cure rate.

Final results were submitted to the Secretary of State, on April 1, 2024, after all provisional voting envelopes had been reviewed and all qualified ballots were processed.

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Report of 1 percent manual tally count per California Election Code Section 15360(e)


I, Ryan Ronco, County Clerk-Recorder-Registrar of Voters, County of Placer, State of California, do hereby certify that on March 12, 2024, at 9:00 a.m., a one percent manual tally began and was conducted and completed in conjunction with the March 5, 2024, Presidential Primary Election.

The California Elections Code requires each local election official to conduct a manual count of all contests appearing on the ballots cast in a randomly selected one percent of the ballots in order to verify the accuracy of the machine count. This manual tally occurs during the 30-day vote-canvassing period prior to official certification of election results and augments extensive pre-election testing activities to demonstrate the integrity of the vote tabulation system.

This report addresses the manual-count to machine-count comparison of a randomly selected one percent of the Central Count and Vote Center Scanners verses hand count. With 29 vote centers, Placer County needed to randomly select one vote center to comply with Elections Code Section 15360. Using black out canisters, numbered 1 through 29, we randomly selected a canister to identify the vote center number for that portion of the manual tally. The vote center selected for inclusion in the manual tally was VC26 – Granite Bay Library. We manually counted 12 additional vote center locations during our manual tally, they included; VC27 – Granite Bay High School, VC22 – Meadow Vista Community Center, VC25 – Foresthill Veterans Hall, VC13 – Springview Middle School, VC19 – The Old Firehouse, VC04 – Maidu Community Center, VC01 – @the Grounds, VC11 – Rocklin High School, VC12 – Sierra College, VC24 – Colfax Veterans Hall, VC02 – Buljan Middle School, and VC09 – Roseville Veterans Hall for a total of 6,062 vote center (in person) ballots. Additionally, mail ballots were included in this process. At the time of the random draw, we had counted 279 batches of vote by mail and Uniformed and Oversea Citizens ballots. We needed to hand count a minimum of three batches to comply. However, we performed the manual tally on seven batches to include all contests. We assigned those batches numbers 1 through 279 and ran a random generator on those numbers. The batches selected were 62, 247, 260, 237, 46, 181, and 182. The following batch numbers were utilized for the manual tally; VBM 4 Tab 34 Batch 58 (62), VBM 2 Tab 32 Batch 53 (247), VBM 1 Tab 31 Batch 35 (260), VBM 5 Tab 35 Batch 56 (237), VBM 2 Tab 32 Batch 45 (46), VBM 2 Tab 32 Batch 30 (181), and VBM 5 Tab 35 Batch 33 (182).

The final number of ballots hand counted for the one percent manual tally this election totaled 7,463 and equaled 5.49% of the ballots cast. The selected vote centers/batches showed exact matching tallies between the manual tally and the election summary report. The entire manual tally was conducted in public view by hand without the use of electronic equipment, no individuals who performed the manual tally at any time during the manual tally process were informed of the corresponding machine tally results. Further, tally logs of the manual tally process were kept. An election notice was published in the legal section of the newspaper to comply with the notice requirements. Lastly, the entire manual tally process was completed prior to certification of the Presidential Primary Election.

15360.

(a) During the official canvass of every election in which a voting system is used, the elections official shall conduct a public manual tally of the ballots tabulated by those devices, including vote by mail ballots, using either of the following methods:

(1) (A) A public manual tally of the ballots canvassed in the semifinal official canvass, including vote by mail ballots but not including provisional ballots, cast in 1 percent of the precincts chosen at random by the elections official. If 1 percent of the precincts is less than one whole precinct, the tally shall be conducted in one precinct chosen at random by the elections official.

(B) (i) In addition to the 1 percent manual tally, the elections official shall, for each race not included in the initial group of precincts, count one additional precinct. The manual tally shall apply only to the race not previously counted.

(ii) The elections official may, at the elections official's discretion, select additional precincts for the manual tally, which may include vote by mail and provisional ballots.

(2) A two-part public manual tally, which includes both of the following:

(A) A public manual tally of the ballots canvassed in the semifinal official canvass, not including vote by mail or provisional ballots, cast in 1 percent of the precincts chosen at random by the elections official and conducted pursuant to paragraph (1).

(B) (i) A public manual tally of not less than 1 percent of the vote by mail ballots canvassed in the semifinal official canvass. Batches of vote by mail ballots shall be chosen at random by the elections official.

(ii) For purposes of this section, a "batch" means a set of ballots tabulated by the voting system devices, for which the voting system can produce a report of the votes cast.

(iii) (I) In addition to the 1 percent manual tally of the vote by mail ballots, the elections official shall, for each race not included in the initial 1 percent manual tally of vote by mail ballots, count one additional batch of vote by mail ballots. The manual tally shall apply only to the race not previously counted.

(II) The elections official may, at the elections official's discretion, select additional batches for the manual tally, which may include vote by mail and provisional ballots.

(b) The elections official shall use either a random number generator or other method specified in regulations that shall be adopted by the Secretary of State to randomly choose the initial precincts, batches of vote by mail ballots, or direct recording electronic voting machines subject to the public manual tally.

(c) The elections official shall not randomly choose the initial precincts or select an additional precinct for the manual tally until after the close of the polls on election day.

(d) The manual tally shall be a public process, with the official conducting the election providing at least a five-day public notice of the time and place of the manual tally and of the time and place of the selection of the precincts, batches, or direct recording electronic voting machines subject to the public manual tally before conducting the selection and tally.

(e) The elections official shall include a report on the results of the 1 percent manual tally in the certification of the official canvass of the vote. This report shall identify any discrepancies between the machine count and the manual tally and a description of how each of these discrepancies was resolved. In resolving a discrepancy involving a vote recorded by electronic or electromechanical vote tabulating devices, the voter verified paper audit trail shall govern if there is a discrepancy between it and the electronic record. *(Amended by Stats. 2023, Ch. 676, Sec. 51. (AB 1219) Effective January 1, 2024.)*
